Any novel worth its salt creates a world true to itself, and if it doesn't the reader feels cheated and the book fails. Truth is elusive, and sometimes shapeshifts depending on perspective. Writers have more time to consider it and seek for it, but during elections especially, it goes awol when it's most needed.
